HOSPICE SOCIAL WORKERS PLAY A KEY ROLE IN END-OF-LIFE CARE

Hospice social workers play a crucial role in providing comprehensive care and support to patients and their families during the end-of-life journey. They offer emotional, psychological, and practical assistance to individuals facing terminal illnesses, helping them navigate complex emotions and decisions.

Our hospice social workers continue to play a pivotal role in providing compassionate care and support to our patients and their families. Throughout the past year, they have been instrumental in facilitating our internship program, offering students from various social work programs invaluable insights into the hospice and end-of-life care realm. By welcoming Bachelor of Social Work (BSW) and Master of Social Work (MSW) interns, we've not only provided these students with hands-on experience but also broadened the understanding of hospice care within the academic community.

Under the guidance and mentorship of our dedicated social workers, these interns have had the opportunity to enhance their educational and professional skills, preparing them for successful careers in social work. We're proud to have collaborated with esteemed institutions such as Keuka College, Capella University, Mohawk Valley Community College, SUNY Canton, and Utica University. Our partnership with Utica University's Masters of Social Work (MSW) program has been particularly gratifying, as we witness the first cohort of graduates contributing to the growing pool of social work professionals in our region.

Through these partnerships and initiatives, we not only strengthen our commitment to providing exceptional end-of-life care but also contribute to the development of future generations of compassionate caregivers.

VOLUNTEERS SUPPORT OUR STAFF AND OUR PATIENTS

Hospice Care volunteers carry on a legacy that can be traced back to the 11th century when it is believed that the concept of hospice was adopted by faith communities as a place of hospitality for the sick and dying. Volunteer programs have come a long way since the Crusades and continue to develop and grow as the landscape of Hospice Services is constantly changing. New approaches are key to our success and HPCI volunteers both past and present stand ready to play a mission-critical role.

One of those volunteers is Navy Commander, Christopher Maurer. In 2023, Navy Commander Maurer helped with the delivery of 125 veteran recognitions. More than the framed certificate and U.S. flag pin he provided; Navy Commander Maurer spent countless hours sitting at the bedside making a deep connection that only a fellow soldier could. When asked what volunteering at Hospice meant to him, Navy Commander Maurer said, "I have the privilege and honor to be a part of saying thank you and recognizing veterans who selflessly served their country. It's important we understand, recognize, and pay homage to their sacrifices and commitment to each of us."

It is a difficult task to place a value on the energy and effort that our exceptional and dedicated volunteers share with us every day. The difference they each make and the purpose it provides them is priceless. HPCI is proud of the 'numbers' but more importantly what they represent. In 2023, more than sixty volunteers provided 3,210 hours in support of Hospice. That is roughly the equivalent of two full-time employees and cost savings of approximately \$114,630. An exceptional representation of compassionate presence, caregiver relief, administrative support, honoring of veterans and so much more.



HOSPICE SPIRITUAL CARE SUPPORTING PATIENTS AND FAMILIES

At Hospice & Palliative Care, Inc. (HPCI), we recognize that addressing the spiritual needs of our patients, their families, and our staff is an integral aspect of providing holistic care. Guided by our nationally board-certified Spiritual Care Coordinator, Wally Plock, we strive to support individuals on their unique spiritual journeys, fostering connection, meaning, and comfort.

Spirituality encompasses a diverse range of beliefs and experiences, from religious practices to personal philosophies. Our spiritual care approach acknowledges and respects this diversity, offering tailored support that aligns with everyone's values and preferences. Whether through prayer, music, sacraments, storytelling, or other rituals, we aim to create a space where patients and their loved ones can explore and express their spiritual identities.

In the past year, our Spiritual Care Coordinator has been actively engaged in reaching out to local faith communities and leaders. Through over two hundred letters sent to area faith leaders, we introduced HPCI's services, expressed gratitude for their community contributions, and extended our support to individuals in need. Additionally, our coordinator had the privilege of sharing the mission of Hospice at the Waterbury Presbyterian Church in Oriskany, fostering partnerships and collaboration within the community.

Our commitment to meeting spiritual needs extends beyond traditional practices to include a diverse range of ceremonies and rituals. From baptisms and funerals to end-of-life ceremonies and weddings, our coordinator ensures that each experience is meaningful and reflective of individual beliefs and traditions. Moreover, recognizing the importance of spiritual care for our staff, we provide ongoing support and encouragement through reflections, listening sessions, and special remembrance services.

As articulated by Spiritual Care Coordinator Wally Plock, "Respecting life means walking together on the journey. It means being unafraid to encourage one another and commit to one another — through difficult times and joyful times." This sentiment underscores our dedication to walking alongside individuals and communities, offering unwavering support and companionship throughout life's journey.

At HPCI, we remain steadfast in our commitment to providing compassionate care that addresses the physical, emotional, and spiritual dimensions of well-being. As we reflect on the past year's accomplishments and look towards the future, we reaffirm our pledge to honor and uphold the dignity and resilience of every individual we serve.



BEREAVEMENT ASSISTS WITH HEALING

Hospice bereavement counselors provide support to our patients' families for 13 months after the death of their loved one. The bereavement counselors contact 60-70 families each month for initial bereavement assessments and provide ongoing counseling to 80-100 families. Our bereavement program is a comprehensive approach which serves our families in multiple modalities, recognizing that each person deals with grief in his or her own way.

Condolence cards signed by the interdisciplinary team are sent out to families after their loved one dies. Bereavement volunteers call our hospice families 3,6, and 12 months after the death of their loved one to give them an outlet to support their grief. The volunteers are an invaluable part of our bereavement support and will refer families back to our bereavement counselors when appropriate for counseling.

Our five bereavement mailings offer families education and validation of their grief. Families have shared that receiving bereavement newsletters throughout the year has given them a better understanding of their process of grief.

Our bereavement groups were held with social distancing and masking to allow for the safety of our staff and the participants. The groups have been well attended this year. Groups included Spousal Loss, Adult Parental Loss, Young Widows, Writing through Grief and Brave Hearts. We recently started doing a monthly get together for kids who have completed the Brave Hearts group.

The Bereavement Services phone line allows us to offer education and referrals to bereaved in the community who call throughout the year looking for resources and support. Educational information and resources regarding coping with grief and the holidays were shared via social media. We were able to do a presentation at Faxton for staff to provide education and support regarding coping with grief at work. We did three grief and the holidays presentations for the community that were all well attended and well received. We coordinated with ICAN to create a support group for the kids and teens they serve. We are working on coordinating with the Veteran's Outreach Center for Development to provide educational workshops for them as well.

We have received positive feedback regarding the services provided by our bereavement team by bereaved clients:






